RRC-4	Off-road vehicles and access management	The unregulated use of 4-wheeler ATVs in the NND traditional territory is causing habitat destruction, wildlife disturbance and increased trail cutting.	The MDRRC recommends that in 1997/98 the Yukon Department of Renewable Resources take steps to define off-road vehicle and related access problems as they pertain to the disturbance of wildlife and their habitats and also to gather background information on how such management concerns have been addressed elsewhere.	31
RRC-8	Enforcement of trapline regulations	Apart from references in the UFA, there is no detailed explanation of how traplines are to be regulated, or what constitutes a by-law. Such information would be valuable to existing and future RRCs as well as encouraging consistency of approach to the by-law process throughout the territory.	The MDRRC therefore recommends that the YTG Department of Renewable Resources in consultation with trappers, the RRCs, YFWMB and First Nations prepare a detailed but clearly worded explanation of what constitutes a ‘local by-law’ and how they are to be enforced according to Chapter 16 of the Umbrella Final Agreement.	38
RRC-12	Trapline compensation	The present system of providing compensation to trappers for negative impacts or loss of their line is confusing in process and unfair in terms of compensation which does not acknowledge factors other than net profit from the concession.	The MDRRC therefore recommends that the Yukon Department of Renewable Resources, in consultation with Yukon trappers, the RRCs, and the Yukon Fish and Wildlife Management Board review both YTG policy and the Yukon <i>Wildlife Act</i> concerning trapline compensation and revise both where needed to facilitate the administration of such cases and incorporate additional factors into the determination of appropriate compensation.	40
RRC-13	Commercial wilderness policy	The potential for wilderness recreation in the NND traditional territory is high and, given the trend towards increasing activity in the Yukon, fish and wildlife and their habitats could be at risk in the future from over-exploitation.	The MDRRC therefore recommends that a commercial wilderness policy be adopted by appropriate governments to manage such land uses for the benefit of the Yukon public and with due consideration for the protection of fish and wildlife and their habitats. The policies should include both a means of monitoring the levels of such recreational activities and dispersing them in a manner consistent with fish and wildlife management strategies for the area.	34

Appendix C: List of issues raised at the May 2002 information workshop, but not included in the 2002-2007 plan

issues not included in the 2002 plan	Why issues were not included
The vegetation in the ditches along the highway needs to be cut. It is currently a danger to people and animals (vehicle-wildlife collisions).	The vegetation is scheduled to be cut during the summer of 2002 and as a result will not be a concern.
The question was raised by community members: can people sell antlers?	The answer was provided at the Planning Workshop: people can sell antlers with a permit from the YTG Conservation Officer. Permits are not given for large numbers of antlers, just for antlers people would have from what they killed themselves. The MDRRC committed to follow-up with an explanation of the answer in an upcoming newsletter.
More signs are needed around Stewart Crossing to keep people safe from hunters.	This had been done at the time of the Planning Workshop and was no longer a concern.
Is the Porcupine Caribou Herd range changing from tundra to more willows?	The MDRRC committed to following up on this question through a request of information by letter from the Canadian Wildlife Service.
Community information is needed about the disturbance study on the Dempster, and regarding new hunting rules for north and south of Eagle Plains.	The MDRRC committed to summarizing this information in an upcoming newsletter, in coordination with the YTG Community Information Specialist.
Grizzly bear studies are expensive but need to be done in NND traditional territory.	The discussions at the Planning Workshop resolved that this is a territory-wide issue that is beyond the scope of this plan.
There should be a public meeting about proposed cyanide use by Advanced Mineral Technologies Canada Inc. (AMT) — Keno Hill.	Representatives from AMT attended the Planning Workshop and clarified that the company has no plans to use cyanide in their operations.
There are concerns that there are contaminants in the water around Mayo.	Concerns about water contamination are addressed through specific assessment processes (water license regulations, etc.).
Important to identify effects of mining on fish.	This is addressed through specific assessment processes (water license regulations, etc.). The MDRRC will follow up by commenting on the review of the Yukon Placer Authorization.
How are sheep being managed in the NND traditional territory portion of the Tombstone park?	NND committed to following up directly with the Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in.
Moose heads are wasted in the Mayo dump.	The MDRRC will address in this concern in their newsletters and NND Game Guardians will check moose kills and the dump.
There are concerns that too many people are killing too many moose.	The discussion at the Planning Workshop resolved that as long as meat is being used and moose populations are healthy, this is not a problem.
We need to come up with a plan for understanding moose populations, range use, harvest, etc. by "moose management units" (MMUs).	This issue is covered in the solutions to other issues in the moose and harvest sections of the plan.
Should we reduce moose harvest in a few sub-zones where harvest is too high?	The discussion at the Planning Workshop resolved that areas of concern would be considered on a case-by-case basis. Moose fill in small areas quickly.
